

CHAIRPERSON'S UPDATE

Throughout 2018, we were busy trying to come up with a new name to replace 'We Care Uniting'. Certainly a great deal has happened since then. We Care Connect Limited was officially incorporated and became a registered charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission in early November 2018 spearheading a great deal of change and new initiatives across the organisation. Not least of these changes was to secure new premises, form a new Board of Directors and leverage its new corporate structure to seek greater access to grant funding, both from the public and private sectors.

In just a few short months, between October 2018 and January 2019, WCC was not only formed, but indeed became transformed. As well as a new Board of Directors being appointed, WCC opened a Bank Account, leased and moved into new premises, purchased shelving, took out appropriate insurances, set about refining its policies and procedures, as well as strengthening its supply chain and channels to market.

As we enter our second "formal" year of operation, We Care Connect Limited goes forward with great credentials; a sound business model, a very devoted and loyal volunteer base and a fine reputation within the local welfare community. We Care, has for some years, been seen by local politicians at all levels as a very effective and worthwhile charity, and I see this not only continuing, but showing signs of growth in the future. With this being the case WCC is well placed to secure future grant funding, to reach more needy children and to further improve it's already much appreciated services.

I wish to take this opportunity to offer my sincere thanks to Derryck and Jackie, who have done a remarkable job. I would also like to thank the volunteers for their loyalty and hard work and the Board of Directors for their enthusiasm and contribution over the past 12 months. Finally, I would like to make special mention of Uniting for their financial and other in-kind support, together with Sparke Helmore Lawyers for providing their services pro bono to help the organisation become established.

LEADERSHIP TEAM

It seems a long time since our first donation day at the Toukley Green in 2016. We put the call out for community donations for prams, high chairs, cots, clothes, nappies, anything baby related. It was a great success, not only bringing in more community donations, but also expanding awareness of our program in the local area. And we have grown from there. I have been working with We Care for several years now and it is one of the most rewarding jobs I've ever had. I had reached a point where I was looking for a new challenge in my own community where I was seeing a great need and this job has been the answer for me. The co-operation, camaraderie, hard work and dedication of everyone involved and the seriousness of the task we have set ourselves owing to the huge need in the large area we now service keeps me looking forward to my time spent with We Care.

It is currently my main job to put together the orders for the older children in the age range 5 to 16 and also to keep a range of shoes available for all children. It is my pleasure to fill an order with the best clothing possible from what is available and then to pack an appropriate backpack with books and craft items. Then comes the difficult but enjoyable task of choosing toys from our wonderful range and making up the whole order in a specially made bag (we all make these in our spare time!) For an older child I will search for lego, puzzles, balls, etc. and then sift through the shoes and slippers available in hopes of having the correct size. Other members of our group make up clothing packs for younger children, linen packs, provide nappies, handbags for the mothers, gift packs for lone fathers, a food pack when necessary and, of course, the large items which include cots, high chairs, car seats, etc. I then put my share of the order with all the other items required and it's ready for the case worker. Job done and satisfaction factor very high.

NEEDS SNAPSHOT

- There are over 10,000 children living in poverty on the NSW Central Coast, and a further 20,000 in the adjoining Hunter region. 2016 Census data.
- The Central Coast has 10 of the most disadvantaged suburbs in Australia (in the lowest SEIFA Index of Disadvantage decile). 2016 Census data.
- The NSW Central Coast has a 30% lower average income compared to greater Sydney, and high levels of housing stress (51% of renters compared with 45% in greater Sydney) with low and decreasing supplies of social housing and rapidly increasing rental and utility costs (2016 data source Judith Stubbs & Associates, report to the Central Coast Council, May 2018).
- 36% of people on the Central Coast have experienced times in the last 12 months when they were short of money to meet everyday needs*.
- One parent families are more prevalent in the former Wyong Shire (14.5%)

Older data but indicative of current trends:

- There is a high incidence of families in stress with high notification levels for child abuse and domestic violence. Of the 82,087 children aged 0 to 19 years within the Region, there are over 15,000 reports of child abuse and neglect with over 4,000 children at risk of significant harm (FACS, 2015)
- Assault-domestic violence related offences, Wyong has a rate of 545.9 per 100,000 population compared to 390.1 per 100,000 for Gosford and 388.7 per 100,000 for NSW (NSW BOCSAR, 2015)

OUR RESPONSE

- Since we started in May 2016, we have supported 5,399 vulnerable children distributing 117,031 children's care and safety items free of charge to over 70 local community support groups and family support agencies.
- Everything we distributed has been donated to us by the community. The new purchase cost to beneficiaries would have been over \$1,000,000 based on equivalent purchase costs at Kmart, Aldi and similar.

NAME CHANGE AND NEW PREMISES

- In October 2018 we incorporated as We Care Connect, an independent PBI charity with DGR status, changing our name from We Care Uniting. Over 2019 we have fully migrated to our new name with new web and social media platforms.
- And another key milestone in January we moved from our previous cramped shared accommodation to our dedicated 200m2 warehouse premises in Wyong together with an amazing donation of 70 shelving units from a local business. And our sincere thanks to Uniting for funding to make all this possible! With such strong growth during this year we are now preparing to add an additional 60m2 floor space early next year.





OUR PROGRAMS

Our core focus is supporting children living below the poverty line and in other vulnerable situations across the Central Coast/Hunter with clothing, nappies, bed linen and essential care and safety items & equipment. All support is given as part of a total package of care by trained case and community workers; the program distributes items free of charge on request to over 70 community support groups and welfare agencies.



Sleep through the Night – Everyone needs a good night's sleep, particularly the parents and carers of little ones. Our Sleep through the night program delivers families with the cots, nursery equipment and linen to safely put their child to sleep every night and day. This program supports the maintenance, distribution, management and in some instances, purchase of new nursery items to deliver our Sleep Through the Night Program.

Fourth Trimester – We support mums and families with the essentials they need to set up home with a newborn. Items can include smaller pieces such as baby clothes, swaddles and wraps, nappies, wipes, breast pumps, baby bottles or formula to larger one-off items such as highchairs, baby mats, change tables and nappy bags. The ability to nourish a newborn baby is a fundamental human right, we work to ensure families are well equipped to provide for their children.

The Wheels on the Bus - The families we help often live with significant barriers that create social isolation. We aim to keep families safe, social, mobile and connected to support services through the distribution of prams, car seats & baby carriers. We re-home capsules, reversible car seats and older children's car seats. We put great care into providing the right 'wheels on the bus', whether it's a carrier for a quick trip to the supermarket, a pram that will definitely fit on a bus or a newborn car seat to bring baby safely home from hospital.



Happy Birthday – Sadly we receive weekly requests from case workers when they know of a child who won't receive a birthday present this year. WCC's Happy Birthday program prepares brand new or completely unused gifts to ensure that children throughout the Central Coast will wake up on their birthday with a present to open.



OUR PROGRAMS



Girl Power - Some girls dream of princesses, some of fairies, some of playing soccer or being a pop star! We Care Connect's Girl Power program provides bundles of girls clothing, books, toys and craft packs so that families can spend time playing, caring and nurturing these dreams. Too often we hear of children who aren't provided the basics, let alone beautiful dress up items, our girl power bundles include both practical and pretty pieces.

Boys will be Boys – We take great pleasure and care in preparing bundles of clothing and items for boys from newborn to 16. We know that boys will be boys, pants end up with holes in their knees, mud in their pockets and sand, well, everywhere! We want children to be having fun, playing superheros and riding scooters and bikes – and their clothes take a toll. Boy bundles can include four sets of shorts, pants, pyjamas, t-shirts and brand-new undies and socks, along with balls, cars, books and teddies.





Youth Hope – over 3,000 of the 10,000 children living in poverty on the Central Coast are aged between 12-16 years. Disadvantaged teenagers are highly susceptible to low self-esteem and social exclusion and this can be a very damaging time. In addition to providing urgently needed clothing items, this program provides the important items such as decent shoes, movie passes, headphones, backpacks and internet access.

It takes a Village - WCC is powered by a team of exceptional volunteers who spend time sorting, selecting and packing bundles to go off to the Central Coast's most vulnerable families. Our It takes a Village (ITAV) program ranges from everything from covering fuel for volunteers to collect and distribute items; tea, milk, coffee and biscuit expenses to keep our volunteers smiling; aprons and name badges; rent costs to house our items and operational expenses which we try our absolute hardest to keep to a minimum!



OUR CORE VALUES

Compassion - The Humanitarian Imperative that when another person suffers, we experience the compassion to reach out and help.

Community - A community program contributing with others to build a community that cares and shares. Being a channel to enable the community to help those less fortunate in a meaningful and fulfilling way.

Action Hands-on direct action- Reaching out at a person-to-person level, taking personal responsibility, not passing the onus to others, doing not talking.

Partnership - An effective program of collective action developing and building on partnerships, with our volunteers, donors and sponsors, case workers, community groups and individuals providing their support, expertise and assistance.



STRATEGIC PLANNING

GOAL 1: Solid foundations

Continue to develop our sound business processes to ensure we can continue to grow a financially viable and sustainable social impact organisation. Rationale: Building on our solid foundations we will develop practices and operations that a critical to supporting our impact and outcomes in a responsible and sustainable manner

GOAL 2: Improve and expand




GOAL 3: Drive societal change

Be a leader in raising community awareness of local social disadvantage and advocating to government, businesses and individuals for societal change.

Rationale: Growing community understanding of, and involvement in solutions for social disadvantage, together with strong advocacy at several levels, will compound our impact with more services and drive societal change.

CONTINUING TO GROW









We collaborate, we don't duplicate - We Care Connect volunteers are not social workers and we don't work directly with vulnerable families, we leave that to the experts. Our role is to provide the clothing and equipment to provide the material needs for families.

Recycle and re-home – Babies and children grow quickly, and we help prevent safe and quality nursery items from going to landfill by accepting donations from the community. Once at the WCC Base, items are safety checked, cleaned and packed for families in need.

What we don't re-home is as important what we do - All items are safety checked to NSW safety standards and we take our role in child safety seriously. Clothing items that won't delight are donated to H&M's Garment Collecting initiative, so we don't consciously add more to landfill.

THE NEXT STEPS

With more than 30,000 children in need across the Central Coast/Hunter and there is much more to be done to reach more and more vulnerable families. The program continues to grow strongly, and we are looking to both increase our warehouse capacity on the Central Coast, and importantly work to setting up a Hunter branch in the short to medium term. We plan to introduce a collection and delivery service in 2020 with our own vehicle and volunteer drivers that will significantly increase our reach and impact.

We continue to reach more and more local vulnerable children both by increasing the number of agencies and community centres we support, and by increasing our range of programs. We are in late stage planning to expand our Young Persons support program in January 2020.

There is much more to do as demonstrated by our continued growth throughout 2019, we haven't reached the plateau yet. A further milestone this year has been our expansion into emergency support for the Department of Community & Justice Central Coast Support Unit, offering same-day response when critically needed.



Our goal for 2020 is to significantly increase our level of support across all our programs – watch this space! Above all program growth will be driven by the energy and motivation of our donors, supporters and volunteers.
